Bring your pup for the show of over 1 million lights, the newest LED light technology, and 200 foot light tunnel. Is National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation your favorite holiday movie? If so, a trip out to Wadsworth may be right for you. At 173 Duane Lane, Wadsworth, OH, the 'Griswold House' is lit nightly with over 2 miles of lights. Crumbl Cookies: Are They Worth The Hype?

Earlier this year, Crumbl Cookies became a viral phenomenon on TikTok and people were driving hours to just get a taste. Now with the new location in Avon that opened on October 22nd, the so-called "best" cookies are only twenty minutes away. I decided that it was time to give them a try and see if the cookies are worth the hype.

Every Sunday on their social media, Crumbl announces the flavors of the week. They always have Milk Chocolate Chip, Chilled Sugar Cookie, and four to five additional flavors. When I visited, the additional flavors offered were Oatmeal Chocolate Chip Muffin, Midnight Mint, Peanut Butter ft. Muddy Buddies, and Key Lime Pie. I spent \$11.50 to purchase the 4-Pack Box with the classic Milk Chocolate Chip, chilled Sugar Cookie, Key Lime Pie, and Midnight Mint.

Although a little expensive for just a cookie, the results were huge. After ordering from the app, I texted them when I was here and my cookies were ready within two minutes. You can also order them in-store and with the in-store kiosks. Upon receiving my order,

the cookies were much larger than expected. They were huge!

Milk Chocolate Chip: 4/5 The Milk Chocolate Chip was a soft and chewy simple chocolate chip cookie. Although it was simple, it was delicious. If you like a crispy cookie, then this wouldn't be for you. But if you're like me, this is the perfect soft and chewy cookie consistency.

Chilled Sugar Cookie: 2/5 The Chilled Sugar Cookie was a disappointment, to say the least. The cookie part was a basic vanilla base with almond-flavored icing on top. The icing was unexpected; it was almond flavor rather than vanilla, and there was far too much almond extract inside. Rather than a teaspoon per batch, it tasted like a teaspoon per bite. Frankly, if there was less almond flavoring the cookie would be good, but there was just too much.

Key Lime Pie: 5/5 The Key Lime Pie was a graham cracker cookie base with lime pie filling, topped with a dollop of whipped cream and a slice of fresh lime. This one was perfect. The texture of the pie filling was very creamy and not too sweet with the perfect hint of lime.

Midnight Mint: 4.5/5 The Midnight Mint was a chocolate cookie, like a brownie with both chocolate chips and mint chips inside. It was served warm. This one was very good! I liked that it was more like a brownie rather than a cookie. The mint chips were also a nice touch because they didn't overpower the chocolate in the brownie. It was the perfect amount of mint.

Crumbl Cookies would be a great holiday gift, whether it is a gift card or some cookies from that week. There is something for everyone! You can even purchase gift wrap when you order online. 


The Best and Worst Cookies According to OFHS

A Look Into Judaism and Hanukkah Celebrations

With the holiday season approaching, everyone is busy buying gifts, baking cookies, and hanging up wreaths. For many, the anticipation of Christmas is what's causing their festivity. However, Christmas is not the only holiday that takes place this time of year. Another is Hanukkah, an 8-day celebration in the Jewish faith that takes place most often between late November and early December. To gain some information on this unique holiday, I reached out to Rachel Newman, a junior and an active member of the OFHS student body. She was very enthusiastic and helpful when giving me an inside look into what it is like to practice Judaism, especially during this religious celebration.

Q1: What is Hanukkah, and what part does it play in your religion?

A1: Hanukkah is a holiday commemorating the Maccabees' victory over the Greeks and the restoration of the Second Temple. The Greeks prohibited the Jews from practicing their religion and made the Second

Temple a Greek temple. The Maccabees fought and eventually forced the Greeks out of Israel. They cleaned out the temple of anything impure when they found there was only enough pure oil to last for one night to keep the Eternal Flame lit. Miraculously, the oil lasted for eight days, which gave time to obtain more pure oil and keep the flame lit. That's why Hanukkah lasts for eight days.

Now religiously, it is a minor holiday. However, because it overlaps with the Christmas season, it has become one of the most celebrated Jewish holidays in recent times.

Q2: What are some of your favorite traditions and activities surrounding this holiday?

A2: "Jews are no stranger to traditions. (Trust me, I know!) Hanukkah's main tradition is lighting the Hanukkah menorah. There are nine spots on the menorah. One is for the Shamash which is the helper candle and the rest are for the candles that increase with the days of Hanukkah.

We say two blessings every night for the candles and for the miracle of Hanukkah. On the first night only, we sing a prayer thanking GOD for getting us to the special moment. Singing is also very common. In our house, we sing the Dreidel Song and "Hanukkah O Hanukkah" after we light the menorah. Then, we open presents. (Yes, we get presents for eight nights!)

It's not a Jewish holiday without good food, and Hanukkah has some of the best. We eat a lot of fried food to commemorate the oil. Latkes (which are my favorite) are potato pancakes. You can eat them with sour cream, applesauce, or ketchup. Sufganiyot are also eaten and they are jelly/custard donuts topped with powdered sugar. There's also Hanukkah gelt which are chocolate coins.

Of course, I cannot forget dreidels. They are spinning tops with four Hebrew letters on them: Nun, Gimmel, Hey, and Shin. There's a phrase associated with the letters. "Nes Gadol Haya Sham," which means, "a great miracle happened there." There's a game that is also played with dreidels that commemorates how the Jews hid their practicing of the Torah."

Q3: What part of this 8-day celebration do you and your family most look forward to?

A3: "Every night, my family lights the menorah, which is always something I look forward to. It's something that brings my family together. Jewish holidays are all about spending time with your loved ones and Hanukkah is no exception. However, I am an honest person so I love getting presents for eight days."

Q4: You've shared that you recently visited Israel. What was it like to experience a place that holds such important ties to your faith?

A4: "This summer, I did go to Israel and it was so incredible. There is not one word I can use to describe how amazing it was. Israel holds a special place in my faith and it was wonderful to

experience it with my camp friends. Seeing how Israel has evolved made it connect with me way more. I definitely experienced a deep connection with the land and it made me sit down and learn more about my faith. It was truly a memorable experience that I believe every Jew should have."

Q5: Is there anything else about your faith and its traditions that you'd like to share or elaborate on?

A5: "Being Jewish is one of the most important things in my life and it makes me so happy to know others want to learn more about it. One of the 613 mitzvahs we have is to educate people. When people want to learn, we teach them and that is my goal with this. I'm so happy people want to learn about Hanukkah. I'm so glad I got to do this."

I'm hopeful that this Q&A helped some learn more about a faith that is different from what they're familiar with, and I definitely learned a lot as well! I'd like to say a huge thank you to Rachel for the in-depth perspective on her faith!



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
