What is a VPN? A VPN is a Virtual Private Network, and your tech-savvy teens are probably a few steps ahead of you on this one. According to Bark.com, "Parental controls that are used to block or restrict content, websites, and apps that deny access are based on the IP address of the user. When accessing the internet through a VPN, your filters see a different IP address so it isn't able to apply the rules. This means that your child can use a VPN to easily bypass the settings you've put in place to keep them from accessing restricted content or platforms." This is also a concern at school, where students may attempt to use VPNs to access blocked sites or inappropriate content. VPNs serve a legitimate purpose, as they allow users to connect to remote networks safely, for example, a remote worker trying to access their company's network from their home office. VPNs encrypt data and protect the identity of the user. However, kids using them to download content or access websites that would otherwise be offlimits to them can be dangerous and even illegal. What can you do? You're prepared with info now...so talk to your kids and let them know that you know more than they think you know...even if you're still figuring it out.
