Lights Up, Bulldogs: An Introduction to Drama!

For students entering grades 1-3

A Guide to Professional Sportswriting

For students entering grades 7-12

Description: Lovers of sports are almost always lovers of sportswriting. For over a century people have relived the joy of a big victory by their favorite team from a skilled writer on the pages of their city newspaper or their favorite sports magazine. Fans rely on skilled sportswriters to keep track of the week-to-week drama of their favorite teams or to imagine the details of the game they missed. More recently, the skills of a sportswriter have been translated into eSports events. In "A Guide to Professional Sportswriting," students will learn how to cover a sports event, and how to translate that coverage into an engaging, entertaining, informative story. Students will learn interviewing skills, writing a lead, prioritizing information, effectively using statistics, providing analysis, using human interest, and writing to a specific audience. Students will also learn and practice being a sports editor.

Bulldog Coding Boot Camp: An Introduction to Programming with Python

For students entering grades 7-12

Description: In this class, students will learn the basics of the computer language Python to promote algorithmic thinking. Students will explore the fundamentals of programming through the creation of a text based game. The students will investigate graphics in Python with the Pygame library. Students will create a final project where they combine their own creativity with the concepts they will have learned throughout the course.

Film History

We will study the earliest moving images, silent film and the emergence of sound, the Hollywood studio system, and the cultural impacts of film throughout the 20th and 21st centuries.

Student Technology Service Leadership

For students entering grades 10-12

Dates: August 10th through August 12th (times TBD based on number of students interested)

Maximum 12 students per session (no maximum on the number of sessions)

Instructor: District Technology Staff and Technology Integration Specialist

Description: Students will learn basic technology skills for support in hardware management/repair and in software support for successful integration in classroom learning. Students will complete Google certification level 1 (test for certification optional and at the student's expense). Students will also develop soft skills of being an independent, self-starter, development of proper office setting behaviors, and customer service awareness.

Upon successful completion of boot camp and Google certification learning the student will be permitted to use late start/early dismissal allowance to report to other buildings within the district to provide service support. A schedule will be set to cover service needs while sharing the experience with other students. Possible 1 or 2 days per week. Will have direct and indirect adult supervision while on campus. Students are responsible for transportation. Training and service hours will be monitored and confirmed through a recognition program.

Social Justice for Change: A Historical and Literary Approach

For students entering grades 10-12

Description: Our goal is to explore contemporary issues related to social justice, rooting them in history and deepening our understanding of them through the study of multimedia, poetry, short fiction, and creative nonfiction. Participants would explore the power of choices at the community and individual level to create lasting change through reading, writing, and engaging in dialogue about contemporary issues every day. This workshop will culminate in an individual or group project designed to put learning about social justice into action.

College Essay Writing Workshop

For students entering grade 12

Description: Students will study effective college essay models, discuss approaches to the Common App prompts, compose their essays, workshop their essays with peers, and receive feedback from the instructor. This assignment aligns with ELA writing standards. It also encourages students to think critically about their own experiences, communicate about those experiences effectively, and collaborate with peers and the instructor to create their highest quality work. Students will leave this workshop with a polished college application essay.

Film as Literature: Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind Case Study

For students entering grades 9 through 12 (Parent Permission Required as film is rated R)

Description: Filmmaking is one of the newest forms of storytelling, but it belongs to a much older tradition of narratives. Students will learn to analyze film as literature with particular emphasis on narrative structure. We will use the 2004 film *Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind* (R) as the basis for our analysis. The focus for this session will be script, dialogue, theme, and narrative structure.

Advanced Placement United States History Bootcamp

For students enrolled in APUSH for the 2021-2022 school year Dates: August 2nd through August 5th 9:00 am to 12:00 pm

Description: APUSH is very often the first Advanced Placement course students take at OFHS, as a result, there is often a bit of shock over the intensity of the work. Students, whether they have been in the gifted and/or advanced tracks or not, often find the level and quality of work surprising. This class will expose students to both the reading and writing expectations of APUSH, as well as taking a first glance at what the College Board expects on the AP Test.
